God also has a <u>moral</u> will and Some have a special calling but it is a sovereign will for the world.

## 4 - It is always <u>prudent</u> to <u>examine</u> ourselves. 2 Corinthians 13:5 Shouldn't We Ask?

If we know that:

- The nation of Israel consistently missed God's will;
- the Jewish high priest and their highest ruling council missed God's will;
- the picky, particular, pious Pharisees missed God's will;
- the <u>historic church</u> even in the scriptures often missed God's will;
- and the visible expressions of the modern church often miss God's will -

It would be <u>reasonable</u> that we should <u>humbly</u> and <u>honestly</u> ask:

- "Am I missing the will of God? Are we together, missing the will of God?"
- "Am I blindly being led by blind guides in a direction that is opposed to, or at least resistant to, the will of God?"
- "Am I engaged in building, advancing, and propping up something that is fundamentally different than what God is wanting to do in the world?"

This <u>season</u> should <u>remind</u> us that other people thought they were doing the will of God when in fact they were <u>clueless</u>.

You may think it is too risky, too costly, too troubling to ask such uncomfortable questions.

I suggest that it is ultimately far too risky, too costly, and too troubling not to ask.
